## **INTERVIEW GUIDANCE - VICTIM/SURVIVORS & WITNESSES**

This is general guidance and does not constitute legal advice. This guidance is most applicable when interviewing potential adolescent- adult victim/survivors and witnesses. #### SUGGESTED CHECKLIST

| Ensure their physical and/or psychological comfort.                                    |

| Would they like someone specific present for support?                                  |
| Review confidentiality.  |
| Thank them for sharing/for their honesty.  |
| Would they like a drink (water, tea)?  |
| Tissues for in-person meetings.  |
| Pen/paper for notes if in person, laptop/computer for notes if meeting electronically. |

#### **BEST PRACTICES**

- · Check local mandated reporting laws before conducting any interviews with minors.
- Stay calm/warm/respectful tone of voice, body language, and facial expressions.
- Be non-judgemental, do not discuss your personal thoughts/feelings.
- Be open-minded, consider all possible explanations, and do not dismiss the interviewee.
- · Don't make any promises.
- · Attempt to de-emphasize your authority when interviewing a victim/survivor or witness.
- Be patient and comfortable with silences.
- · Let the interviewee do most of the talking; utilize self-disclosure sparingly if at all.
- Actively listen; paraphrase back to them every so often.
  - Ex: "I just want to make sure I understand, what happened was..." or "I'm hearing that....., is that right?"
- Allow the interviewee's responses to guide the interview, use their words in follow-up questions whenever possible.
- Use open-ended questions to encourage more detailed answers beyond yes/no.
- If the interviewee refuses to answer a question, assure them that it's ok. If they are ready to share in the future, you will be here to hear them.
- At the end, ask if there is anyone else that you should speak to someone who may be a witness, have experienced the same or similar, or someone they confided in.

### SAMPLE OPEN ENDED QUESTIONS

- 1. Can you tell me more about [paraphrase interviewee]?
- 2. How long has this been going on?
- 3. What happened when [paraphrase interviewee]?
- 4. How did you figure that out?
- 5. What makes you think that?
- 6. What happened first/right before/next/after/etc?
- 7. How did it start?
- 8. What else was happening?

- 9. Where did it happen?
- 10. How did you know when it was over?
- 11. How did it feel when [paraphrase interviewee]?
- 12. Who else was present or may have seen what happened?
- 13. Who else is aware of this and when did they become aware?
- 14. What else do you think I should know?
